It was a former bank building. A five-story stone beauty with fluted marble columns, built back in the day when banks were solid and imposing. I will take my work out of storage and install it here. I will bring my books and set up a library and reading area. I will work according to the rising and setting of the sun. I will make this my Daylight Studio.




































































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
